THE NUMBER OF SERVICES SSI CURRENTLY PROVIDES

Humanitarian Settlement Services (HSS), for refugees and humanitarian entrants

Status Resolution Support Services (SRSS), for asylum seekers living in the community

SSI Housing, for HSS and SRSS clients, people at risk of homelessness, and people who need affordable long-term accomodation

Settlement Services program (SSP) NSW Settlement Partnership delivers SSP for migrants, refugees and humanitarian entrants

SSI Multicultural Foster Care, for children from CALD backgrounds who are in out-of-home care

Ability Links NSW, to support full and active participation of people with disability in their communities

Ignite Small Business Start-ups, a self-funded enterprise facilitation initiative for refugees

Employment Services, for HSS and SRSS clients, and jobactive and ParentsNext participants

Youth Services, to support young people from refugee, asylum seeker and migrant backgrounds



Social capital – building blocks

- Definitions:
 - Naturally occurring social relationships among persons that promote or assist acquisitions of <u>skills</u> and traits valued in the market place (Loury)
 - Social capital is the sum of resources, actual or virtual, that accrue to an individual or group by virtue of possessing a social network (Bourdieu)
 - Refers to features of social organisation, such as <u>trust, norms, and networks</u>, that can improve the efficiency of society (Putnam)



Social capital – social cohesion

Social capital facilitates effective participation in society and social connectedness, which in turn provides a foundation to relate to others, build relationships and trust which are essential factors for enhancing social cohesion and inclusion.

Learning how it works


- Trauma informed playgroup
- In language in culture
- Uses playgroup model
- Transition to local playgroup
- Support through staff and volunteers incl. language support
- Gradual withdrawal of support





Ability Links – inclusionaspirational goals

- Find ways to be a part of your local community
- set goals, plan for your future
- build confidence to achieve your dreams
- develop existing support networks - create new networks.





Evaluation of Ability Links

- Urbis evaluation of state program
- Cost benefit analysis found 2.4 dollars benefits for every dollar invested
- SSI 64% of clients are of CALD background and 75% of all CALD clients across the state are serviced by SSI – market share of SSI is 20%
- "SSI builds trusted relationships because it employs bilingual/bicultural staff"








Humanitarian Settlement Program

 - Social participation






Evaluation of HSS

- Used the Building a New Life in Australia study
- Survey based interviews
- Compared the SSI client cohort to the BLNA cohort
- Social participation dimensions:
 - > Make friends in Australia
 - Understand Australian ways/culture
 - Talk to your Australian neighbours
 - > How well are you settling



Other strategies

- Capacity Building
- Leaders Forums
- English, volunteer experiences, education, employment (RESP, CCP)
- Simulation
 - Experience Centre
 - Social enterprises





Factors of success

- From sense of safety to expansion of understanding and action
- Aspiring to goals empowerment
- Increasing cultural know how
- Linking to broader society social capital
- Courage, resilience and support
